The programme aims to inculcate literary and critical thinking among the students in English literature by comprehending various literary theories. It aims to develop critical, descriptive and analytical view point in the students about the socio-cultural behaviour of people. The objective is to nurture among student a view point of a socially responsible and ethical aware citizen. The under graduate programme will have 10 courses in 6 Semesters in 3 years. In the Fifth and the Sixth Semester 01 paper is given as optional. In the Fifth Semester it is proposed to have Dissertation/Project keeping in the spirit of the New Education Policy 2020 to introduce research at the graduation level. The structure of syllabus is based on the template of UGC proposed for the CBCS for undergraduates in English (Regular).
